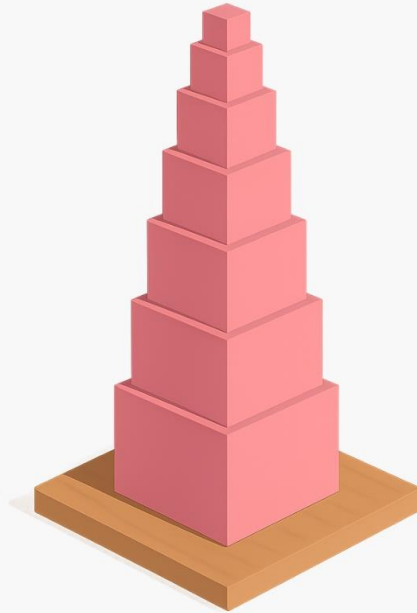

### **Administrative Questions**

#### **About the Program:**

1. How long has the school been operating?
2. What ages do you serve, and do you offer a complete Montessori program through elementary?
3. How do you ensure authentic Montessori practices?
4. What is your student retention rate?

#### **About Teachers:**

5. What Montessori training do your lead teachers have?
6. How long have your current teachers been with the school?
7. What ongoing professional development do you provide?
8. What is your teacher turnover rate?

#### **About Curriculum:**

9. Can you walk me through a typical day in each age group?
10. How do you assess children's progress?
11. How do you handle children who struggle or excel?
12. What is your approach to homework and testing?

## **Philosophical Questions**

### **About Montessori Implementation:**

- 13. How do you maintain the integrity of the Montessori method?
- 14. How do you handle discipline and conflict resolution?
- 15. What role do parents play in the school community?
- 16. How do you support children's emotional and social development?

### **About Individual Needs:**

- 17. How do you accommodate children with special needs?
- 18. What support do you provide for children who are struggling?
- 19. How do you challenge children who are ready for more advanced work?
- 20. How do you help children transition to other schools?

## **Practical Questions**

### **About Operations:**

- 21. What are your policies regarding sick children?
- 22. How do you communicate with parents about their child's progress?
- 23. What meals and snacks do you provide?
- 24. What is your emergency preparedness plan?

**About Costs:**

- 25. What does tuition cover, and what are additional fees?
- 26. Do you offer financial aid or scholarships?
- 27. What supplies will we need to purchase?
- 28. Are there volunteer requirements for families?

## **Red Flags to Watch For**

Be cautious if you encounter any of these warning signs:

### **Educational Red Flags**

- Teachers lecturing to large groups regularly
- Excessive use of worksheets or academic drilling
- Heavy emphasis on competition or external rewards
- Rigid scheduling with no choice for children
- Limited or poor-quality Montessori materials
- Single-age classrooms (not mixed-age)

### **Staff and Administration Red Flags**

- High teacher turnover
- Reluctance to discuss Montessori training or credentials
- Unwillingness to allow classroom observations
- Poor communication or defensive responses to questions
- Lack of clear policies or procedures



## **Environment Red Flags**

- Chaotic, cluttered, or overstimulating classrooms
- Lack of outdoor space or nature connection
- Poor maintenance or safety issues
- Children appearing stressed, bored, or disengaged
- Authoritarian or punitive discipline approaches

## **Financial Red Flags**

- Unclear fee structures or hidden costs
- Pressure to make immediate decisions
- Reluctance to provide references from other families
- No clear refund or withdrawal policies

## **Classroom Observation Guide**

### **What to Look For**

#### **Overall Atmosphere:**

- Peaceful, purposeful activity
- Children engaged and concentrating
- Quiet, respectful interactions
- Sense of community and cooperation

#### **Student Behavior:**

- Children choosing their own work
- Working independently and collaboratively
- Helping younger children
- Displaying confidence and self-direction
- Showing respect for materials and each other

#### **Teacher Interactions:**

- Observing and guiding rather than directing
- Speaking quietly and respectfully to children
- Individualizing instruction based on observation
- Facilitating rather than controlling

## **Materials and Environment:**

- Complete sets of Montessori materials
- Everything in good repair and properly arranged
- Materials accessible to children
- Beautiful, orderly, and inviting spaces

## **Questions to Consider During Observation**

1. Do the children seem happy and engaged?
2. Are teachers attentive but not overwhelming?
3. Is there a good balance of activity and calm?
4. Do older children help younger ones naturally?
5. Are children free to move around and choose their work?
6. Do the materials look authentic and well-maintained?
7. Is the environment beautiful and inspiring?
8. Would I want to spend my day in this space?

## **Observation Etiquette**

- Arrive on time and follow the school's guidelines
- Sit quietly and observe without engaging children
- Take notes discretely

- Save questions for after the observation
- Respect the classroom routine and teacher's focus on children

## **Making Your Final Decision**

### **Comparing Your Options**

Create a comparison chart including:

- How well each school meets your essential criteria
- Pros and cons of each option
- Your child's comfort level at each school
- Practical considerations (cost, location, schedule)
- Your gut feeling about each community

### **Trust Your Instincts**

While checklists and criteria are important, also consider:

- How did you feel welcomed at each school?
- Where did your child seem most comfortable?
- Which community feels like the best fit for your family?
- What does your intuition tell you?

### **Making the Decision**

Remember that no school will be perfect, but the right school will:

- Align with your family's values and educational goals
- Meet your child's individual needs and learning style
- Provide an authentic Montessori experience
- Feel like a community where your family can thrive
- Support your child's development in all areas

## **Understanding Costs and Financial Considerations**

- Showing kindness and respect to others

## **Creating a Montessori-Friendly Home Environment**

- Provide child-sized furniture and tools
- Organize materials so children can access them independently
- Establish routines and consistent expectations
- Encourage choice-making within appropriate limits
- Model the grace and courtesy you want to see

## **Easing the Transition**

- Visit the school multiple times before starting
- Read books about starting school
- Practice the daily routine at home
- Talk positively about the upcoming experience
- Address any concerns or anxieties openly

## **Building a Partnership with Your School**

### **Understanding Your Role as a Montessori Parent**

#### **Supporting the Philosophy:**
